Heather's view by the Chief Executive, Heather Lawrence

Jenny Hill – Vice Chairman and Non Executive Director for 11 years – is standing down at the end of the maximum time allowable for a non executive of this Trust.

Over the years Jenny has made a significant contribution to the Trust and we will miss her energy, enthusiasm and expertise in helping to take the Trust forward.

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A new financial year begins in April, but let us just pause and celebrate the success of last year where we have achieved our targets for:

- Total time in A&E four hours or less
- Outpatients waiting times
- Outpatient and elective (inpatient and day case) booking
- Cancer two week wait
- 12 hour waits for emergency admission via A&E post decision to admit

We are also close to financial balance. On the secondary targets, we have achieved 76% compliance on Information Governance – this is a significant improvement on last year. A&E staff worked flexibly over the Easter weekend (adult and children) to ensure we met the 98%.



The Trust Board joins me in thanking each of you for your tremendous contribution.



As we continue to develop our services we are embracing the 10 high impact changes launched in March, known as IMPaCT (see page 5). I am keen that we incorporate our service changes into a structured programme of service improvements with the aim of improving the quality of patient and staff experience.

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Over the Easter weekend the Surgical Directorate, working with ISS Mediclean,

re-located each surgery ward so that we can separate emergency from elective cases to maximise the efficiency of the Treatment Centre and to minimise the cancellation of operations.

We are about to launch the Corporate Plan for 2005/06 and each Directorate has its own plan – do you know the key objectives of your part of the service?

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Diversity and equality is a key objective and I would like to thank those members of staff who joined the Executive Team Away Day to share their experience and to provide us with insight to help us lead a more fair organisation.

separate emergency and elective (planned) care which should help to ensure that fewer operations are cancelled because of emergencies. This includes dedicated beds on David Evans wards for people undergoing orthopaedic

procedures such as hip and knee replacements.

"We would like to say a big thank you to all staff including ISS Mediclean who worked over the Easter break and also to our patients for their understanding."

SPOTLIGHT ON... SPOTLIGHT ON... Clinical Coders

The team spends its time abstracting information from patient records regarding conditions and treatments received whilst in hospital.

The information is then converted into codes using the World Health Organisation International Statistical Classification of Diseases and Related Health Problems (ICD10) for diagnoses and the Office of Population Census and Surveys (OPCS4) for operations and procedures.

Vicki joined the Trust in December having worked for two years at the Royal London. Vicki qualified in Health Information Management in Sydney Australia. Vicki said: "The coding process allows for statistical data to be gathered on the types of patients treated by the hospital and the cost in treating them.

"This is particularly important as the What happens with all the information the hospital receives and records on the 50,000 patients who are admitted to this hospital every year? Find out here in this month's spotlight which falls

on the Clinical Coding Team. The hospital's team of ten clinical coders is headed up by Manager Vicki Phan she says that what they do is important not only to ensure the Trust gets the funding it needs but also provides valuable information for future planning and budgeting of services for the Trust.

Government has introduced the new Payment By Results scheme which is effective from April 2005 for all NHS Trusts. Therefore it is vital

that all inpatient episodes are coded on time and accurately to ensure the Trust is reimbursed for all the patients they have treated.

"The hospital admits more than 50,000 patients a year and there are strict monthly deadlines for coding to be completed. In order for this to be achieved we rely on the availability of accurate and legible documentation which details the main condition treated or symptom(s) investigated (if it's an injury, how did the injury occur and where),

other conditions affecting the patient's stay, chronic illnesses, and the medical procedures or operations they received.

"Incomplete or unavailable documentation can make a huge difference in the amount of money we can claim. For example an Acute Myocardial Infarction (in other words, a heart attack) with complications (e.g. respiratory arrest, postoperative infection etc.) is charged at £3676* and an Acute Myocardial Infarction without complications would only be charged at £1775*.

"Not only is it important for the correct information to be recorded for patients but it is also important to highlight the effect this would have on funding as well."

Making an IMPACT

In March the Trust launched IMPACT - a new initiative which will bring together everyone's efforts to improve services for patients.

IMPACT stands for IMproving services for Patients At Chelsea and Westminster Trust. It is part of a national scheme which aims to support hospitals in delivering improvements in key areas including patient and staff experience, access to services, quality and safety and value for money.

More than 55 people attended a special event held in the Postgraduate Lecture Theatre from clinical and managerial staff as well as our partners from the Primary Care Trusts and Strategic Health Authority. At the event Dr Colin Bunce, one of the lead clinicians for the national programme, presented data from the hospital - which had been analysed by the Modernisation Agency.

Medical Director Dr Mike Anderson who attended the event said: "We need to think differently about the way we work as it will soon be required to complete the whole patient journey from GP to treatment within 18 weeks - making it essential for us to co-operate closely with our partners in primary care."

Senior Nurse in main theatre recovery Kit Burnett said: "The content was pertinent and interesting. It encouraged us to think about the way we manage

All NHS Trusts have to achieve Improving Working Lives Practice Plus status by April 2006.

Here is a reminder of some of the initiatives we have introduced to support the Improving Working Lives programme.

Equality and diversity

An Equality and Diversity Group and a Gay and Lesbian Staff Association have now been established. A Black and Minority Ethnic group is in an exploratory stage and discussions are underway with employees with disabilities.

A Trust-wide equality and diversity conference is planned for May 2005. Watch this space!

Staff involvement and communication

Staff are involved in a range of committees across the Trust to ensure that they are fully informed and engaged. For example the Trust's Consultative Committee (Negotiating Group) and Joint Management Trade Union Committee (JMTUC) meet monthly.

Medical Staff Committees also meet regularly. Staff Side representatives attend the corporate induction sessions to promote staff involvement and union/professional body membership. There is also active promotion of Trade Union membership and involvement by managers at all levels.

Healthy workplace

Briefing sessions on security awareness will be taking place. A risk assessment of security in all areas throughout the Trust will be carried out so that action is taken to protect staff.

Pensions information is communicated to staff preemployment, at induction and at appropriate career stages. The Trust provides financial planning for life courses and pre-retirement seminars. Information on pensions and financial planning was made available during the Valuing Staff Week held in August 2004.

Celebration of success


Soft Services Manager Philip Holmes said: "The sign amnesty was a great success and I would like to say a big thank you to Andy Denton who spent hours laminating!"

What patients said about us

Results of the 2004 and 2005 NHS patient survey

A questionnaire was sent to 1,700 patients. A total of 712 people responded; 282 to the Emergency Department survey (34.7%), and 430 to the Outpatient Department survey (51.7%).

- 89.4% of patients reported that they would rate the care received in the Emergency Department as either excellent, very good or good.
- 91.2% of patients said they rated the overall care that they received at the outpatient department was excellent, very good, or good.

What patients said about our Emergency Department

In 12 areas we were in the best performing 20 per cent of NHS Trusts across the country. In 49 areas we performed within the average and there were two areas where the Trust performed below average.

At a time when most patients are seen and treated within four hours, we are particularly pleased to have received positive feedback around communications. Patients coming to the Department felt that they Every year the Healthcare Commission publishes the results of surveys carried out with patients to get their views about how their local NHS is performing.

The questionnaires were developed using a series of focus groups with patients to identify their main concerns.

In this month's *Trust News* we report back on the results of two recent surveys which asked patients about their experiences of our Emergency and Outpatients Departments. This important information contributes to our star ratings.

had enough time to discuss their health or medical problem and that staff explained their condition and treatment in a way they could understand. Patients also commented positively that staff listened to what they had to say and that they were treated with dignity and respect.

Key findings of the Emergency Department survey

- 85% of patients reported a wait of less than two hours before being examined by a doctor or nurse practitioner.
- 94% of patients reported that the doctor or nurse explained their condition and treatment in a way that they could understand. A

further 3% reported that they did not need an explanation.

- Whilst the majority of patients feel involved in their treatment, 13.7% of patients reported that the doctors or nurses talked in front of them as if they weren't there.
- 9.9% of patients reported that the emergency department was either not very clean or not at all clean. This is currently being looked at and will feature in the Trust's future action plan.

What patients said about our Outpatient Department

In seven areas we were in the best performing 20 per cent of NHS Trusts across the country. In 58 areas we performed within the average and there were 11 areas where the Trust performed below average.

Again people attending our outpatients department gave us some positive feedback around communication. Patients felt that staff members listened fully to what they had to say and they were able to speak to our reception staff without others overhearing.

Key findings of the Outpatient Department survey

- 15.3% of all patients said they were not given a choice, but would have liked a choice of appointment times.
- 23.5% of patients reported that they had their appointment changed to a later date by the hospital.
- 97.7% of patients reported that they were able to gain access to the hospital and move around the outpatient department with ease.
- 7% of patients reported that they wanted to use their mobile phone but was not allowed to, or they wanted to use a public phone but couldn't.
- 15% of all patients reported that doctors and/or other staff spoke in front of them as if they weren't there.

What next?

There will be a presentation of the results of these surveys at 2pm on 27th April 2005 in the Gleeson Lecture Theatre. The information will be used to prioritise areas for action and will also be used to inform current service improvement work in the Emergency and Outpatient Departments.

A big thank you from our PEAT assessment teams who were out and about the hospital on 9 February looking at the hospital's food and environment.

The Government's Patient **Environment Action Team** (PEAT) rated us with a green light two years ago - which means that we now carry out our own assessment of the overall standards for the patient and staff environment at the hospital on an annual basis.

PEAT is part of a major drive by the Government to improve the hospital environment for patients, visitors and staff. Key areas assessed include quality of food, cleanliness of wards, furniture, decoration, tidiness and the provision of single sex accommodation. A new measure which was added this year related to infection control.

This assessment has now been submitted to the Department of Health and will go towards our star rating which is expected to be

published in the summer. The internal inspection team is very hopeful that we will get a three or four out of five rating but are still waiting for news.

The February 2005 self assessment teams were led jointly by Edward Donald, Director of Operations and Andrew MacCallum, Director of Nursing. Each assessment team also had a representatives from the Nursing and Facilities Management teams, which were Sharon Terry, Roz Wallis, Sue Greenland, Helen Elkington, Philip Holmes and Catherine Horne (ISS-Mediclean). This year the Trust was also delighted to have the support and commitment from three patient representatives Elizabeth Thomas, Anne Hodson and Shirley Anne Jennings.

When explaining why she took part in the PEAT inspection, Elilzabeth said: "I visit the Hospital regularly as a patient. I have always wanted to be involved in the Hospital's affairs and I believe it is important for Chelsea and Westminster to maintain its high standard of care.'

Facilities Manager (Soft Services), Philip Holmes said: "Having patient representatives is so valuable – a number of excellent suggestions were

made during the day - at least one of which we will be implementing. The suggestion was that our housekeepers wear different coloured gloves when serving food. This is such a simple thing but will make a lot of difference by giving our patients more confidence in our hygiene standards.'

The team felt that staff were very helpful when they were carrying out their spot checks on the Burns Unit, Emergency Department, St Mary's Abbotts, St Stephen's Centre, Intensive Care Unit and Neptune Ward.

The PEAT team were impressed with everyone's drive and commitment to continually improve the quality of the environment.

Particular areas which the teams felt needed attention included nurses' stations, signage, cleaning of bed frames, floor coverings and toilets light pulls. These and other improvements are now being pulled together into an integrated Trust wide action plan.

Philip Holmes added: "There was a real hunger from staff to have feedback from our visits which was really encouraging and something we will be making sure we do at every level in the organisation.'
